<p>The Police and Crime Plan overarching objectives are to deliver Safe, Resilient and Connected communities where everyone plays their part for Devon, Cornwall, and the Isles of Scilly, with the following high-level priorities identified:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Antisocial behaviour • Drugs and alcohol • Violence • Theft <p>The Plan aims to ensure that the many different and diverse communities of Devon, Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly feel safe through the reduction of crime and disorder. This plan aims to benefit all residents of Devon, Cornwall, and the Isles of Scilly (around 1.8 million people). The plan also has specific regard to the diverse environments in which our communities may be victims of crime; towns and city centres, countryside and coastal communities, homes, neighbourhoods and roads.</p>

The plan outlines a commitments to “Ensure that everyone who comes into contact with the police is treated fairly and with respect” As well as a specific commitment to end violence against women and girls.

There are pockets of deprivation across both counties, particularly in towns and cities such as Exeter, Torquay and Plymouth.”

	<p>The Devon, Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Peninsula Strategic Needs Assessment 2022/23 includes an oversight of key data in relation to demographics in the region including demographics relating to groups and individuals with protected characteristics.</p> <p>https://www.torbay.gov.uk/media/19388/peninsula-strategic-assessment-refresh-2022_23-final.pdf</p> <p>“Around 104,000 students also have an impact on localised demand for services at predictable times within the academic year and they are identified as particularly vulnerable to crime. Our population is less ethnically diverse than the national profile. People from White English/Welsh/ Scottish/Northern Irish or British ethnic groups make up 92% of the population. People from white minority groups make up 4% and all other minority groups combined make up the remaining 4% (compared with 7% and 17% respectively for England and Wales). People from ethnic minority groups may feel more isolated and vulnerable and may lack support networks and a strong voice locally and this may be particularly strongly felt in rural areas. Plymouth, Torbay and Exeter are urban centres of significant size but the remainder of the population across the Peninsula is spread between smaller urban clusters, market towns and villages. There are a large number of seaside towns that have their own unique issues. In addition to the usual types of crime and disorder issues associated with urban areas anywhere, CSPs face additional challenges in providing equal access to services for widely dispersed communities. The Isles of Scilly are a cluster of islands located off the far South West of Cornwall. 	<p>9. What are the main findings from consultation?</p>

<p>In October 2024 the OPCC embarked on a public engagement exercise to inform the development of the new Police and Crime Plan. The engagement exercise ran from 4th - 28th October 2024 via an online survey. The survey asked members of the public for feedback on key aspects of the plan, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• The four community priorities of tackling violence, anti-social behaviour (ASB), drugs and alcohol, and theft• Within the context of our towns and city centres, countryside and coastal areas, on our roads, and in our homes and neighbourhoods.• The clarity of the plan and its potential to deliver positive change. <p>We considered approximately 600 consultation responses received and a full analysis of the survey findings can be provided.</p>

Sex	<p>In recent years there has been an increase in the reporting of violent crimes against women and girls such as sexual offences and domestic abuse.</p> <p>News coverage of the tragic murders of several women in the UK brought to the forefront public concerns about the safety of women and girls and their risk of experiencing violent crime in public spaces. Women are also less likely to feel safe walking alone in public settings than men (ONS, 2022).</p> <p>In February 2023, VAWG was included within the strategic policing requirement, which recognises VAWG as a national threat alongside terrorism and serious and organised crime.</p> <p>Evidence from the Crime Survey for England and Wales (CSEW), considered the most reliable data source for measuring the prevalence of VAWG, shows that women are more likely to be victims of sexual assault.
